Clinical Application of Craniosacral Therapy in Chronic Pain Management

Craniosacral Therapy (CST) or Craniosacral Osteopathy is a branch of Osteopathy. In most European countries, Osteopathy is a postgraduate professional development curriculum for physiotherapists. In the last few decades, CST has been increasingly used by physiotherapists, massage therapists and other healthcare practitioners.

The primary purpose of CST is to release the tension of the craniosacral dural system and the central nervous system, and to normalise the fluid circulation (blood and cerebral spinal fluid) of the CNS. It can help to enhance the function of the parasympathetic nervous system and hence improving self-healing functions and reducing stress. One of its clinical benefit is to manage chronic pain conditions.

In this seminar, the speaker will introduce the concept of craniosacral therapy in a mechanical and fluid dynamic model. He will guide the participants in experiencing the assessment of the craniosacral rhythm, which is a very subtle rhythm correlated to CSF flow, and to apply the technique to improve the condition of chronic pain.

Kerry is the Chairman of the International Acupuncture Association of Physical Therapists (IAAPT) and a former Chairman of the Registration Committee of the Physiotherapists Board of Hong Kong. He has been a former Vice President of HKPA, Chairman of the Sports Physiotherapy Group (now SSG) and founding member of the Acupuncture Specialty Group (now AIMSG). He has been using CST for some twenty years in his 30 years of career as a physiotherapist. He has conducted courses of CST in Hong Kong, Macau, Beijing, Shanghai, Ningbo and soon in Fuzhou.
